Dennis Whittington from Code Enforcement had recently investigated a fire, possibly resulting from code violations. He reminded us to change the batteries in BOTH our fire alarms and CO2 detectors. Changing the batteries whenever we are switching to/from Daylight Savings Time is an excellent way to remember when the last time the batteries in those devices were changed and insuring the batteries are fresh in case they are truly needed for an emergency.

President's Report

I meet with the Madison Park Parents group on February 24th to let the group know that we support their efforts. The group intends to do events on a monthly basis. I'll pass along more info when I get the details.

I meet with the Madison Park Book Club on the 24th to let that group know that we support their efforts. The group plans to meet monthly, choose 10 books a year to read / discuss with no meeting to be held during December.

Margaret Sexton led the Adopt-A-Street cleanup on Saturday March 7th. About 10 people showed up and picked up 16 bags of trash. A reminder that going forth the pickups will be semi-annually on the First Saturday in March and October.

Heidi and Russell attended a Jane's Walk workshop on March 3rd. Discussion will continue on how we can create a "Jane's Walk" for the Madison Park.

On February 15th, Valerie finished and submitted a Communications and Marketing grant that would support our partnership with Pinewood Elementary. As the grant goes through the process, Valerie will provide updates as necessary.

CMS Boundary Change Request update - As discussed last year, Valerie has been pursuing a request with CMS to change the Madison Park boundaries to be more geographically central to our community, specifically around our middle and high school designations. The request would have Madison Park attend - Pinewood Elem (same as today), A.G Middle (or more likely Sedgefield based on capacity) and Myers Park High School. The application is due on March 13th and volunteers Daniel Beckham and Kevin Nunnery have agreed to work with Valerie on this project. CMS will be reviewing all of MeckCo schools in regard to capacity and need thus the push for us to apply now vs. in 2016. We hope to send a survey to the community via the HOA email distribution list to ask for feedback from the community (the survey should be available later this month). All data gathered will help with the request for realignment. In addition to working with Eric Davis/CMS, our team has partnered with Montclaire in their pursuit to ensure we stay in alignment with our goals for both neighborhoods. We will keep you posted as we progress through the application process.

Several new development projects along the South Boulevard corridor that may will affect Madison Park over the next year. The old Hooters is being replaced by a Take 5 Oil Change place. Pike Nursery has gotten plans approved to modify Seneca Place. Dynamic Health has gotten plans approved for work in the old Villa Antonio's space. The Sam's Mart at the corner of South and Tyvola has also submitted plans for modification to their structure. Director Daniel Beckham asked about the possibility of getting some of the developers to help in installing traffic calming devices (speed bumps, round-a-bouts, 4 way stops, etc.) since development will increase neighborhood traffic. Past President Valerie Delby stated that Spectrum Development is working with CDOT to do that in the areas of our neighborhood that will be impacted by their upcoming project on Abbey Place.

We have begun using MailChimp for our neighborhood-wide e-mail blast. Our initial load was about 670 names. During the month of March we have added almost 5% more subscribers. About 44% of the recipients are opening the e-mails we send. 62% view our mailing on a mobile device. One online community indicated that 84% of neighbors that interact with us are less than 55 years old.

Madison Central Park Sign was recently hit by a car and damaged. As a neighborhood, we will repair the sign and be working on a strategy to pay for repair / maintenance to things we have installed. Insurance is a possible option ...more to come as we develop a strategy to make sure we cover such items as the need arises.

Neighborhood-wide Street Light plan, we have 49 streets in the neighborhood and most have poor lighting. We are looking at what is needed to develop a plan for the entire neighborhood, with feedback from CDOT; there a few options which may involve mailing costs to the residents or lots of volunteer leg work. City Council member at large, Claire Fallon (who happened to be in attendance) stated that currently the city has NO funds to pay for neighborhood street lights and that safety concerns are focused on police and fire funding.

Mr. Sehii Volevakha who is a Fulbright Scholar in the Psychology Department at UNC-Charlotte addressed the audience. He is researching how leaders and members of community / grassroots organizations can make positive changes in their communities. He is seeking participants for an online survey taking approximately 5- 7 minutes to complete, anyone interested in participating supplied their contact information.

Guest Speakers

Meg Fencil, Sustain Charlotte

Meg educates, engages and unites communities through Sustain Charlotte programs and is actively engaged in fostering partnerships with the community. Sustain Charlotte is a non-profit outreach organization with a mission to inspire choices that lead to a healthier and more vibrant

community for generations to come. They are an organization that works with neighborhoods and schools to solve problems locally on a grass-roots level. The organization has helped neighborhoods to compile Sustainable Vision Plans by empowering them to set measurable sustainability goals in the neighborhood such as reducing household energy use, improving access to healthy food, reducing the amount of waste going to the land fill and getting more residents out of their cars and into public transportation.

The organization priority issues include air quality, job / income, energy, food, land use, equity / empowerment, transportation, waste and water. Did you know Charlotte is the second fastest growing metro area of the United States? In our region we drive an average of almost 20 miles per person every day, compared to less than 11 miles per day in 1982. The resulting increased congestion costs us \$525 million per year in wasted fuel and lost time or \$876 annually/person For more information go to http://www.sustaincharlotte.org

The Gifted Gardner program is part of the Therapeutic Recreation Section of Mecklenburg County Park & Recreation Department. It is housed at the Marion Diehl Recreation Center located at 2219 Tyvola Road. Adults with developmental disabilities, ages 18 and up (out of high school) can spend weekday morning enjoying a variety of instructional classes. All classes are from 10AM until 12 Noon. The program helps the participants with job and living skills. They employ 7 therapeutic workers, and always looking for volunteers.
