The officers stressed that they have a few leads on the burglaries and how important it for us to be aware of suspicious behavior / vehicles / persons in the area and to immediately report such to 911. They emphasized the importance of reporting details (dented vehicle, tattoos, and physical attributes) of anything that looks suspicious. Some tips on **How to reduce your chances of being the next victim**:

• Don't leave your garage door or storage sheds unsecured, even when you are at home. Thieves can remove items quickly without your knowledge.

- Make sure your house is well lit. Turn on outside lights, spotlights, motion lights, etc. Leave several lights on timers when you are away to give your home that lived in look.
- Keep all shrubbery trimmed. Do not allow shrubbery to conceal windows and doors.
- Remove anything a burglar could use to gain entry or to knock out a window or door: ladders, wood, tables and chairs, etc.
- If you are going away contact a trusted neighbor or friend to pick up your mail, newspaper and other deliverable items.
- Don't advertise new gifts or purchases. Break up cartons before leaving them at the curb or dispose of them another day.
- Document all serial numbers and description of items of value. Without this information your chances of recovery if stolen are significantly reduced.
- Call the police (911) if you notice anything suspicious
- If you see a burglar in action, get a good description of the burglar, the car and tag number. Write it down and call 911 immediately.

# Speaker

Tim Porter, Assistant City Arborist, City of Charlotte addressed the group about the importance of banding our trees against canker worm infestation. The worm's favorite food is the city's willow oaks but they will eat other deciduous tree leaves as well. The fall cankerworm is an insect native to North America. It is typically found from Georgia to Nova Scotia and west to Texas. It has a four stage life cycle: egg, pupa, larva (caterpillar) and adult. After mating in December, the female moths crawl up trees to lay their eggs on twigs and mall branches. As the trees leaf out in the spring, the eggs hatch leaving small green caterpillars to feed on the leaves. In most cases, the cankerworm will not kill the trees; however repeated defoliation can weaken trees and make them more susceptible to other stresses, such as age, drought, other insects and disease. Once they hatch in the spring, the cankerworms can balloon to other nearby trees. They are very light and can be blown from one tree to another. This is why it is important for neighbors to organize or "band together" when applying tree bands.

For the past 20 years, the cankerworm population in Charlotte has continued to grow. Natural controls have not been adequate to bring the cankerworms to a level that isn't harmful to our tree canopy. Aerial spraying in 1992, 1998 and 2008 and other natural factors reduced the population for several years. Entomologists cannot explain why the cankerworm populations continue to increase but the City's large concentration of old willow oaks may promote the infestation. Tree banding in November and December is an effective way of controlling the cankerworm. By applying a glue barrier to the tree trunk, the wingless cankerworm moths are trapped as they climb the tree. For best results, trees should be banded around the last week of November. It is important to wait until most leaves have fallen from the trees so they don't get stuck to the tree bands. He also instructed us to cut off the bands in early spring (early March). Last year staff discovered there is a beetle in the area which feeds on cankerworms. The predator is the Fiery Searcher Beetle, which grows to more than an inch long and will climb trees to get to the caterpillars. These beetles have been known to eat hundreds of caterpillars a day.
